What are the Core Competencies?

The Core Competencies are a set of intellectual, personal, social, and emotional skills and abilities that all students need to develop so that they can engage in deep, life-long learning.

There are six Core Competencies:

Communication: How students exchange information, experiences and ideas.

- Connect and engage with others (to share and develop ideas)
- Acquire, interpret, and present information (includes inquiries)
- Collaborate to plan, carry out, and review constructions and activities
- Explain/recount and reflect on experiences and accomplishments

Creative Thinking: How students generate new ideas and take them from thought to reality.

- Ideas have novelty and value
- Generating ideas
- Developing ideas

Critical Thinking: How students make judgements based on reasoning and available information.

- Analyze and critique
- Question and investigate
- Develop and design

Positive Personal and Cultural Identity: How students create healthy personal and cultural awareness in a pluralistic society.

- Relationships and cultural contexts help to shape who you are
- Personal values and choices
- Personal strengths and abilities

Personal Awareness and Responsibility: How students develop awareness of skills and strategies to stay healthy both physically and mentally.

- Self-determination (a sense of personal value and growing confidence)
- Self-regulation (taking responsibility for your own choices and actions)
- Well-being (mental, physical, emotional, social, cognitive, and spiritual wellness)

Social Responsibility: How students contribute positively to their families, community, society, and the environment.

- Contributing to community and caring for the environment
- Solving problems in peaceful ways
- Valuing diversity
- Building relationships
